IAN HERNANDEZ



IAN HERNANDEZ, Marietta College

Hernandez, a member of Penn's State Championship Baseball Team, will sign with Marietta College to continue his academic and athletic careers.


"I went on my visit to Marietta and could really see myself walking around campus," Hernandez said. "With a beautiful campus and field, it is where I knew I wanted to be for the next four years."

Hernandez, a 6-foot-2, 160-pound pitcher, posted a 2-1 record in 23.0 innings pitched for the Kingsmen.

The Kingsmen right-hander had a 1.22 earned-run average and a .913 WHIP (walks/hits per inning). Hernandez struck out 25 and walked seven, allowing only 14 hits in his 23 innings on the mound.

Hernandez credited all aspects of Penn's program with helping prepare him for the collegiate level.

"Here at Penn, we work almost as much and almost as hard as some colleges," Hernandez said. "Specifically, the coaching staff here at Penn pushes you to be the best you can be. They push you to put 100 percent of your effort into things on and off the field."



ADAM LEHMANN



ADAM LEHMANN, Western Michigan University


Adam Lehmann, the starting catcher on Penn's State Championship Baseball Team, will suit up for the Western Michigan Broncos of the Mid-American Conference for his collegiate baseball experience.

Lehmann, who is 6-foot-3, 207 pounds, is a right-hander. At the plate, Lehmann hit .356 and drove in 20 runs.

Also one of Penn's top pitchers in the 2022 season, Lehmann was 3-1 with one save. He had a 1.65 ERA and a 1.059 WHIP. Lehmann struck out 49 in 34 innings of work, and he walked 16, giving up 20 hits.

"I chose Western Michigan because of the culture there," Lehmann said. "The coaches have developed a family-type relationship with the players. They are in a highly competitive conference. It's a great program with resources to make their players better, and also the school itself is very social and is located in a great city.

"I feel that attending Penn has really set me up for college athletics because of the coaching we have here at Penn," Lehmann said. "Our head coach was a Division I athlete that also got drafted into the major leagues. He has five state championships under his belt and has produced many collegiate athletes. I feel like he coaches our team as if we were a college team, trying to be the best we can to set us up for the next level."

Brayden Schoetzow, who helped Penn win a State Championship in Baseball, will continue his academic and athletic careers at Wright State University.


Schoetzow committed to Wright State because of the team environment and energy.

"I wanted to be a part of a program that showed how much the coaches and players cared for one another," Schoetzow said. "They all have the mindset to get better each and every day."

Schoetzow said playing for the Kingsmen has prepared him to play in college by putting him in pressure situations.

"Being able to perform well in these situations is one way Penn has prepared me," Schoetzow said. "Penn has also prepared me with discipline skills. For example, in practices leading up to a game and working on things we have been struggling with."

In Schoetzow's junior season for Penn, he finished with a 1.37 ERA, pitching 51.3 innings, only allowing only 29 hits and 10 earned runs. He struck out 62 batters and accumulated a 10-0 record. He was 8-0 in the Northern Indiana Conference.



MARKUS BURTON



MARKUS BURTON, University of Notre Dame

Markus Burton will be furthering his academic and athletic careers at the University of Notre Dame.

The 6-foot-0, 160-pound senior will be a point guard for the Fighting Irish Basketball Team.

Burton has been a standout player for the Kingsmen, leading Penn to a share of the Northern Indiana Conference crown and the Elkhart Sectional Championship.

In his junior season, Burton broke out, averaging 27.2 points per game, 5.6 rebounds per game, 6.3 rebounds per game, and shooting 46.7 percent from the 3-point line.


Burton comes in as the 19th-ranked point guard in the country, while also being the fourth overall player in the state of Indiana.

Burton says that he knew Notre Dame would be his pick, right after he got the offer.

"I feel like being home at Notre Dame is great because I have the whole 574 supporting me," Burton said. "Coach Rhodes was a part of my growth throughout the years I was at Penn and I thank him a lot."

Senior leader and teammate Joey Garwood said that Burton has the characteristics of a player that has what it takes to succeed at the next level.

"Markus is a well-rounded teammate who does the little things on and off the court," Garwood added. "He has a hard work ethic that will carry him far in life. As he goes on to his college career and further, he will be a standout player for years to come."

Economou said Purdue also offers the academic programs that she wishes to pursue in the future.

"I know the environment is going to be competitive but fun," Ladson said. "It will be competitive on the field going up against other teams in the conference, as well as in the classroom."


Ladson will take the field with the team next year in the goalie box.

Hatkevich said she chose the University of Toledo because of the coaching staff and players.


"I love how determined and genuine the coaches are and the players at Toledo were super welcoming and reminded me of my friends here," Hatkevich said.
